

Dear Friends,

This weekend, we will have a couple of changes at Mass. Sister Valentina of the Oblate Sisters will speak to us on the Annual Retirement Fund for Religious and Deacon Larry will preach. Next week we will take our second collection for the Retirement Fund for Religious.

Sister and Deacon Larry are speaking this weekend to help us accommodate next week being the Feast of Christ the King and the following Sunday being the First Sunday of Advent. Of course, between these two feasts is Thanksgiving.

Just writing about these coming weeks makes me feel as though November will be over before we know it. In fact, time seems strange during these days of the pandemic. (Hebrews 13:8) There's something about our relationship with God, through Jesus, that allows us to live our lives in this world even as we keep our eyes fixed on eternal life.

Saturday, November 7, I was advised to go into quarantine due to the fact that I had been with a parishioner who had COVID-19. Later that day, I was told that since I had the N95 mask on the whole time, quarantine would be unnecessary. I am grateful to Father Ernesto for stepping in to cover for me when I was abiding by the quarantine. I am very happy that I did not need to quarantine further. Please pray for those with COVID-19 and those in quarantine. We continue to pray for each other as we do our best to persevere and even thrive during the pandemic.
